Jane Sanford Keppler.

Jane Sanford Keppler was born in 1952 in Logansport, Louisiana but moved with her family to Conroe, Montgomery County, Texas when she was five years old. She presently lives in Bastrop, Texas with her husband, Rev. Mike Keppler. Jane Keppler has been engaged in extensive genealogical research for years. Mrs. Keppler has been a member of the TXGenWeb for 22 years and Montgomery County was her first county. She began as a local volunteer for the TXGenWeb Project in 1996 as the Montgomery County coordinator, and in 2004 Jean Smoorenburg began to partner with her for the Montgomery County TXGenWeb Project. Today Jane is one of the Assistant TXGenWeb Project State Coordinators and maintains 13 counties in three states. She is also surfing chairman for the TXGenWeb, meaning her committee picks a "County of the Month." Mrs. Keppler has been recognized by the TXGenWeb Project with an award for 20 years of service as the Montgomery County Coordinator. She has also served as an active

member of the Montgomery County Genealogical and Historical Society (MCG&HS) and received the MCG&HS's Hall of Fame Award in 2004.

Jean Huot Smoorenburg

Jean Huot Smoorenburg has lived in Montgomery County since she married her husband Anthony Smoorenburg in 1977. Jean is a graduate of the University of Massachusetts and a retired teacher. Her accomplishments as a genealogist are extensive and she is recognized nationally for her work in this field.

She was the former genealogy HAL-PC SIG (Special Interest Group) Leader at Houston Area League of PC Users in Houston Texas and was the Deputy Editor of HAL-PC Magazine from 1991–2008. She has been a member of Clayton Library Friends and the Montgomery County Genealogical and Historical Society (MCG&HS); former editor of their publication, *The Herald;* and served as Vice President of membership and publicity. She received MCG&HS' Hall of Fame Award in 2005. She is also a member of the Heritage Museum of Montgomery County and the Margaret Montgomery Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR.) More recently, she has served on the board of the Conroe Community Cemetery Restoration Project, a non-profit organization formed to preserve the historic African American Community Cemetery in east Conroe.

In 2000 Jean Smoorenburg began teaching genealogy classes at Lone Star College-Montgomery for <u>ALL</u> (Academy for Lifelong Learning): *Beginning Genealogy, Genealogy in the 21st Century, Intro to Researching Across the Pond after 1850, and Genealogy Software.* She was recognized by ALL as one of its Teachers of the Year in 2010. After 15 years, she retired from teaching in the ALL Program at the end of 2015.

In October 2007, Phyllis Stehm and Mrs. Smoorenburg began MCG-IRG (Montgomery County Genealogists'-Internet Research Group) to help others learn to effectively search on the Internet. In 2013, she began teaching a class in DNA in the ALL Program and as an outgrowth have begun a DNA Discussion Group that meets regularly.

She joined TXGenWeb on October 2, 2004. She has served as Jane Keppler's Assistant Coordinator on the Montgomery County website since then and has helped others with their genealogy research. Jane has allowed Jean free reign to do the maintenance and updates on the Montgomery County website. Jean Smoorenburg declares that she has learned so much about Montgomery County, Texas forefathers and records of our county along the way. Jean frequently coordinates with County Historical Commission chairman Larry Foerster and

others on new articles of historical interest that can be added to the archives of the Montgomery County TXGenWeb Project website.
