Conroe Community Cemetery never had a name. It was simply known as the Conroe Cemetery, No-Name Cemetery, or the Community Cemetery among the older African Americans in Conroe. Burials there date back to the 1800s and include not only former slaves, but some of the most influential African Americans in local and Texas history.

# Forgotten Leaders

A few of those interred at the Conroe Community Cemetery who were leaders in the African American community of Texas include:

# *Luther James Dorsey* (1850-1939)


James Dorsey was most likely an ex-slave who joined the U.S. Cavalry in 1873. He is the only known Buffalo Soldier to be buried in Montgomery County.





*Mittie J. Campbell* (1875-1933)

Mittie Campbell was the founder and principal of the first African American public school – Conroe.



James Pitts was an early African American educator from Conroe who opened the first black school in Jefferson, Texas. In 1942, the State of Texas recognized him as the leading educator of African American students.





# Jacob F. Cozier (1830-1903)

Jacob F. Cozier was a pastor and teacher at the Union Church in Huntsville, Texas founded by Joshua Houston, a former slave of Sam Houston.
