1850

Let I.W.D. Creath, a missionary from Huntsville met with a few people in the community of Danville, just north of Willis in a house in the neighborhood of Zill McCaleb to discuss the possibility of organizing a church. A committee was formed. The charter is organized with 30 members and is named Danville Baptist Church (of Christ). Bro. J.V. Wright is called as the first pastor and serves for 10 years.

1862

The new pastor, Bro. Byars was a true Texas Baptist Pioneer. The Texas Declaration of Independence was signed in his blacksmith shop, and he was Sam Houston's blacksmith.

1865


- Black members are allowed to withdraw from the church in order to start their own church.
 1866
- May produced 10 baptisms; June produced 7. 1868
- Hard times in the community forces most of the people to move elsewhere. Letters are given to remaining members and the doors are closed.

1870

A few of the Danville residents migrate to the settlement of Esparanza which, mistakenly, was expected to experience growth from the railroad. The majority migrate to the town of Willis where railroad tracks were being laid. This town is destined to thrive in the coming years.



1872

* A young mission is started in Willis. Along with the remaining charter members from Danville, they band to form Willis Baptist Church (of Christ). During these early years, many people felt it necessary to include the phrase 'of Christ', therefore we have many instances where the clerk includes this phrase. However, most of the time we are referred to as Willis Baptist Church. This new mission under the leadership of Rev. R.F. Harris began meeting in a community hall, then to a schoolhouse until the former Danville church building is moved here.

1877-1879

* Bro. Snodgrass accepts as pastor for \$200 per year ¼ time (preaching once per month), however, many people begin moving their membership to various communities around the area. Those that were left gave very little, bringing financial difficulties for the church. Pledges for 1878 totaled only \$97. Pastors were called and voted on a yearly basis, and for the year 1878, no pastor was called. Bro. Snodgrass became principal of Montgomery School, but continued to preach 1 Sunday each month for whatever money could be pledged. Lack of records lead us to believe that the church was virtually dormant off and on for the next couple of years.

❖ We have a record of a service in July, 1880 or 1881 with Bro. Peddy preaching.

1885

- The church is re-organized as The Baptist Church at Willis with a membership of 29. Bro. Peddy is voted in unanimously as pastor and a Sabbath School is started with Bro. Sapp as Superintendent.

- Elder R.F. Harris re-organizes the church as The Willis Baptist Church of Christ with 52 members. 1894

1900

We voted to pledge \$5.00 to Association Missions. A committee was appointed to raise the money. \$4.50 was collected.

1901

- Rev. George M. Daniel becomes pastor. He was the grandfather of the later Texas Governor of the 60's, Price Daniel. Along with partner, Sam Houston Cain, became pioneer Baptist preachers while establishing 14 churches and baptizing 1200 converts.
- In May, 1901, the Mount Calm Baptist Church near Waco in Hill County requested an ordination of Bro. Carey Daniel, who had been called to be their pastor. On a Saturday night service in June, examination and voting were conducted after an interesting sermon by Elder Stark to a packed congregation. The next day Rev.

McJunkin of Waco preached to a packed and very interested congregation. George M. Daniel delivered the charge, and Elder L.T. May presented the Bible. The church then resolved to immediately hold a revival, and Bro. May remained to do the preaching which continued night after night to a packed house until July 8. There were 26 baptisms, 17 joined the church and the Lord's Supper was served on the final night to a still packed congregation. According to the minutes, "Thus closed the most glorious revival meeting in Willis."

1903

❖ Revival is held in May – 12 baptized, 1 joins by statement and 2 rejoin by letter.

1904

A two-week revival is held by Bro. Fuller. 18 are baptized.

1906

- * The pledges are so few that a committee is formed to investigate the spiritual condition of the church. Pulpit committee cannot come up with enough pledges to call a pastor. However, the former pastor, Bro. Pipkin is found in Huntsville. We plead with him to come any night he chooses to preach for us.
- A Christmas Program is arranged with the cooperation of the Methodist Church.

1910

❖ 5.81 acres are purchased.

1912

- ❖ Lots 9 −10 of blk 14 are purchased.
- Mrs. Fouts organizes and conducts our first Sunbeams. The WMS is re-organized during this time.
- During the leadership of Bro. W.P. Grow, the Sunday School has the largest enrollment up to that time.

1919

- ❖ A collection is taken each month toward paying to have the Baptist Standard in each home.
- ❖ A letter was sent to each member regarding making a monthly offering.
- Giving was so poor that a committee was appointed to canvas the members and bring names of those not living [giving] in accordance with their obligation to the church. This committee of "investigators" was later dissolved.

1924

❖ A resolution is passed that all members living in the vicinity of Willis Baptist Church live in constant disregard to the interest of the church are subject to exclusion upon same being brought before the church – a resolution that this church goes on record, that from tonight on, the church will enforce discipline on those members.

First spades of dirt were turned by the oldest member, Miss Ella McIntyre who was baptized in 1901 and the youngest member, Thomas Segers who was baptized Aug. 1958. Mr. George Boring, chairman of the building committee

spoke briefly. Berton Yates lead the dedicating prayer.

- The old white church is sold and moved just east of town and became The Sanctified Church of God (black). It burned down in April of 1960.
- May 31st, we met for the first time in the new sanctuary and revival began with evangelist, Mart Hardin.
- June 6th closing of the revival and Dedication & Homecoming Day


